### Improving your bridge

One of the "fun" hands during the congress cropped up during the Saturday qualifying round:

Dealer: S Vul: none	<ul><li>↑ -</li><li>↓ Q 4 3</li><li>↑ A K 9 4</li><li>♣ A J T 8 4 2</li></ul>	Most pairs bid a slam in spades (six in 7S, seven in 6S), making 12 or 13 tricks. Those making only 12 (fortunately for the grand slam bidders, it didn't happen to them) were struck down by that seldom-used gadget called the "Lightener double". East was void in clubs, so got a ruff and it is surprising that not one defender against 7S found the Lightener double.
	N W E S	Assuming a relatively normal bidding sequence of a Game Force 2C opening by South, followed by a natural and positive bid of 3C by South, once slam was reached, several Easts made a Lightener double, which requires partner to lead something unusual, normally dummy's first bid suit, in this case clubs.
	<ul><li>AKQJ8763</li><li>✓ A 6</li></ul>	One pair was in 6C (making), which is a terrible score in pairs, however it scored better than the hapless pair in 4S.
	♦ - • K95	The remaining three pairs bid NT. One pair, playing a relay system, knew precise shape and controls, so could count eight spade tricks, three aces and two kings. This added up to 13, so bid the winning 7NT grand slam. They had

The results on this board demonstrate the need for many partnerships to learn to collectively count to 13. Surely after a GF opening and a positive response, in any bidding system South can find out that North has two aces and a king, and so can count 13 tricks?! And, in pairs, NT scores better than a suit contract.
